Investing in Our Future Together

When NMSU achieves its goal of upgrading its research status — eventually to R1, the top level in the nation — it will benefit all of us. But getting there will take dedication to a collective effort.

These requests represent not only investments in NMSU but also in the communities we serve. R1 status will draw more of the world’s best researchers to NMSU, giving our students an even more enriching academic experience while making them more marketable at graduation. These future Aggies will drive economic development in New Mexico to greater heights. Meanwhile, the research conducted systemwide will continue to align with the needs of our diverse and widespread communities, helping citizens to live their best lives.

To bolster its research efforts and standing, the university requests:

- Significant investment in faculty compensation to better align the university with its Research 2 peers, with the eventual goal of reaching Research 1 salaries
- Support for graduate assistants in the form of tuition, stipend and health benefits
- Investment in the Technology Enhancement Fund to support matching and closing of federal grants and contracts
- Capital investment in the Agricultural Science Centers to address deferred maintenance and improve facility conditions
- Support for Research and Public Service Projects with a proven track record of leveraging federal dollars (New Mexico Produced Water Consortium, Water Resources Research Institute, Space Commercialization, New Mexico Artificial Intelligence Alliance)
- 10% operations support for the Agricultural Experiment Station and the Cooperative Extension Service, which also have a proven track record in attracting federal research dollars

Additionally, NMSU is requesting support to enhance its reach as a statewide, land-grant institution. As such, the university requests:

- One-time support for NMSU Global to reach more rural communities and those with limited internet access
