General Revenue FY26 Consensus Revenue Estimate

The Consensus Revenue Estimating Group* has projected a 2.8% increase in General Fund revenue for New Mexico, reaching \$13.4 billion for FY26. This includes \$659.6 million in "total new money," which is the difference between the estimated revenue for FY26 and the total appropriations from FY25.

Key points from the projection include:

- Revenue Growth: The increase is driven by higher distributions of oil and gas revenues to the Severance Tax Permanent Fund and the Early Childhood Education and Care Trust Fund, along with tax relief measures for New Mexicans.
- **Income Taxes:** Revenues from corporate and personal income taxes are expected to drop by 6.5% in FY25 due to the Child Tax Credit, reformed tax brackets, and new credits. However, a moderate 2% growth in income taxes is anticipated to resume in FY26.
- **Gross Receipts Tax:** This revenue is expected to grow by about 1.8%, tempered by previous rate cuts and new or expanded deductions.
- **Oil and Gas Revenue:** A slight decline of about 2.3% in oil and gas revenue to the General Fund is expected this fiscal year.

*The group includes economists from various state departments and the Legislative Finance Committee (LFC). They caution that national and global events, such as changes in global oil markets and economic trends, could impact these projections.

Since its inception, the committee's role in the state budget process has grown as the complexity and size of the budget has increased. In 1991, LFC assumed responsibility for the performance audit program, previously a part of the Office of the State Auditor."

NMSU Leadership Tours Agricultural Science Centers to Promote Infrastructure Investment

In a dedicated effort to support infrastructure investments that will result from the passage of the 2024 General Obligation Bond Package, NMSU Interim President Monica Torres, Agricultural Experiment Station Director Jay Lilywhite, Vice President of Facilities and Services Raghu Raghavan, and Assistant Vice President of Government and Community Relations Clayton Abbey, recently embarked on a tour of NMSU's Agricultural Science Centers in Clovis, Tucumcari, and Clayton. Their mission: to engage with local legislators and community leaders, and underscore the importance of Bond Question 3 on the upcoming November ballot.

This General Obligation bond is set to provide \$51 million to the NMSU system, including \$15 million specifically earmarked for improvements at the Agricultural Science Centers. These funds are crucial to advancing NMSU's land-grant mission and addressing the needs of New Mexico's agricultural sector through cutting-edge research and community engagement.

During their visits, President Torres and other university leaders witnessed firsthand the aging infrastructure and outdated research areas that are in dire need of renovation. Despite these challenges, the centers continue to produce groundbreaking research. Current projects include the sustainable production of corn, innovative feeding practices for the cattle industry, the use of biochar in soil conservation and carbon sequestration, and the development of virtual fencing technologies.

Keep in mind that deadlines can shift, and sometimes funding opportunities may be added or removed.
